# ASKEW: a design studio for urban youth

ASKEW, a design studio for urban youth located in the 1900 block of Fredericksburg Road, employs about 15 high school art students from Jefferson High School. The students work tile mosaic on tabletops, stepping-stones, and projects commissioned by the city. Then the art is finalized and sold to the community. As for the projects commissioned by the city, students are paid and get public attention from the media.

Two major city projects this year were a mosaic cow named the "17 Moovelous Young Voices" and the Deco District Signs. The "17 Moovelous Young Voices" helped raise \$23,000 for cancer research. The cow made it through the cow parade and is now displayed in the San Antonio Downtown Public Library. As for the Deco District Signs, about 18 Jefferson students, some working in pairs, made 10 double-sided, 2ft-by-4ft tiled mosaic signs with images representing different aspects of San Antonio. The signs (three are up already) will be placed along five blocks of Fredericksburg Road and are to stay for many years to come.

The owners of ASKEW, Colleen and Tom Frost, work together to keep the studio open to young artists from around the community. Both give young artists the opportunity to start off early in life, begin a good work ethic for the future, get known around the city, and even receive scholarships. Carly Garza and I received scholarships to the Southwest School of Art and Craft. Both of us are now attending classes there throughout the summer. As for further opportunities, Colleen and Tom gave funds to the first 4 students who committed themselves to ASKEW to pay for their Thomas Jefferson Art Club trip to Washington, D.C.

## FROM THE EDITOR

In this issue we have a number of important subjects to discuss. First, I'm very proud of the fact that Ouentin Drive leads the entire Monticello Park Neighborhood Association in both homeowner memberships and alley clean-up dues paid (see Treasurer's Report). It's obvious that the Quentin folks (my household included) are just a better group of neighbors. And if that doesn't throw down the gauntlet to the rest of the Association, I don't know what will.

We do have to consider that out of approximately 700 households in the MPNA boundaries, only 147 have contributed to the \$15 membership dues and to the \$5 "Alley Clean-Up Fund." Both are extremely important. This is an improvement from the start of this year when we only had 91 household memberships, but it is still nowhere good enough. (The "Alley Clean-Up Fund" is becoming more and more important by the day. It seems that the City will try to find any excuse to close our alleys to garbage pick-up. At a total cost of \$20 a year, just the wit and wisdom in this newsletter is worth that measly sum. Heck, it would be worth it with another couple of zeros added on at the end . . .if I say so myself! Seriously, it is the most basic way for each of us to show support for our community. So please, send in your dues.

November is fast approaching and that will be the time to vote for a new association president, a new board of directors, and a new newsletter editor. It is extremely important that our association be well represented and that its board be replenished with new neighbors and ideas. Get involved. We've come a long way and we want to go much farther.

### CODE COMPLIANCE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

#### ANIMAL NUISANCE - DOGS AND CATS

There is a growing concern by the residents of the neighborhood about the incidences of loose dogs and cats wandering the yards, alleys, and streets of Monticello Park. This goes on during the day and especially at night. Some pet owners are violating city ordinances that prohibit loose animals. In addition, these pets are depositing their fecal matter on other neighbor's yards. In the upcoming newsletters the neighborhood association will be addressing several nuisance and code issues in the neighborhood. We will be researching stray animals' code compliance and reporting incidences. This applies to stray dogs as well as stray alley cats. We will address issues with the dog walkers in the neighborhood who do not pick up behind their pets as they walk them. There is a \$2,000 fine (City of SA Ord. # 79180) for these violations. Did you know that an average-sized dog dropping produces millions of fecal coli form bacteria? Bacteria source tracking studies have found that nearly 20% of the bacteria present in storm water runoff for urban stream water quality could be matched with host animals i.e. dogs. These bacteria can pose health risks to humans (especially pregnant women), which can result in the spread of disease.

#### JUNK AND INOPERABLE VEHICLES

We will be reporting junk in the yards and inoperable vehicles that are an eyesore in the neighborhood. We will be inviting code compliance officials for a review of the neighborhood, and do a block- by- block walk with the city agents.

If there are other code compliance issues that anyone wishes the association to address, please contact any MPNA board member.

With this issue we introduce "The Officer Serda Report" Officer Serda is our neighborhood SAFFE Officer. That means that for any non-emergency issues or problems, he is the man to contact. In emergencies, always dial 911.

Officer Serda's column will update us on crime in our 'hood, interpret facts and figures, and give insights into what we can all do to make this as safe a place to live as possible.

Officer Serda is eminently qualified. He joined the San Antonio Police Department on January 23, 1983, and has vast experience in the field. He has done undercover work, been a member of the "Special Operations Unit," and served in the first Gang Unit from 1989 until 1993. In 1987 Officer Serda was honored as the San Antonio Officer of the Year.

#### THE SERDA REPORT

It's that time of the year, Hot and Hotter, a time when we see a lot more activity outside and we see a jump in property crimes also. I took a look back from 04-26-04 through 06-24-04, the past two months, and found Monticello Park Neighborhood had 11 property crimes, most occurring on Donaldson Street where there were 5 reports, next was Club Drive with 3 reports, the rest were scattered across the Monticello area. It should be noted that on these two streets there are numerous apartments, which have been plagued by more than usual activities. The 3 burglaries of habitations occurred during daylight hours. Of the 7 burglaries of vehicles, 4 occurred in broad daylight and 3 after 10:00 p.m., all within blocks of Thomas Jefferson High School. We had one stolen vehicle that was recovered a block away on Club Drive. Apparently the owner of the car left his keys dangling from the trunk. There were no suspects nor were there witnesses to any of these reported crimes.

#### Here are a few tips that will help you keep what's yours:

- 1. Never leave anything in a vehicle you are not willing to part with.
- 2. Even the best vehicle security system can be defeated.
- 3. If you are going to leave a purse or briefcase in the trunk, do it at another location before you reach your destination.
- 4. Layer your vehicle security. For example, install an alarm and a steering wheel lock, not just one or the other. Or combine other security measures, such as brake pedal bars, steering column sleeves, and window etching.
- 5. Don't leave valuables in plain view, including phone charges, radar detectors, CD's etc.
- 6. Avoid poorly lit areas.

Remember, you should always report any suspicious activities. If you become a victim, report the incident or crime as quickly as possibly so the police can take appropriate action. If you are a victim of a property crime, request that your home or vehicle be dusted for prints, so that if police later develop a suspect in any property crimes in the Monticello area we can compare the prints to the ones taken in your home or vehicle and attempt to get a match in order to put these criminals in jail. Till the next time, be alert and be SAFE!

**Executive Director Search Update:** 

As you may know, the CDC was involved in a search for a new executive director. It is my pleasure to report that we have hired a new Executive Director. Her name is Mariana Peralta Dannelley and she officially joined the CDC last month.

Mariana has a broad background in business administration and communications, marketing, public relations, strategic planning, and budgeting. In addition, she has extensive experience with non-profits, volunteer organizations, working with boards, and grant writing. She brings a lot of enthusiasm and excitement to the Deco District and we are proud to have her on our team.



Redevelopment of the Deco District Building Update:

The committee in charge of this project is currently preparing for the construction phase. Up to this point their time and effort has been focused on pre-development activities. We are continuing to work with the various City departments and the contractor, James Lifshutz, while we attempt to keep the project on schedule. Some of the pre-development activities that took place in the past few months are as follows: The City approved the purchase of 5 homes directly behind the building along Beal Street to create much needed parking for the Deco District. The plan calls for the two structurally sound homes to be relocated as part of the City's Housing Asset Relocation Program (HARP). We are awaiting final word from the City as to when this work will take place. The parking lot will have landscape buffer parallel to Beal along with lighting that minimizes bleed onto the surrounding homes. This parking lot will serve the redeveloped building along with offering parking relief for the corridor.

**Business Committee Update:** 

The CDC Business Committee has formed and is meeting on a regular basis. Local business owners are anxious to begin sharing ideas on improving the district and increasing their business. Current businesses involved in this committee are CeeCee's Café, Farmer's Insurance, MacGromb's Uniforms, Optical Headquarters, Jefferson State Bank, Alamo City Aikido, and Primrose at Monticello Park. They expect even more businesses to participate now that the word is getting out. The entrepreneurs in the Deco District value your patronage. The CDC appreciates everything you do to support our local small businesses; keep it coming!
