Since its inception, Project Cool has collected and distributed nearly 72,000 box fans to senior residents throughout the community. Last year alone, over 7,800 San Antonio/Bexar County seniors received fans through Project Cool's outreach.

Polly Wanna Cracker? by Sarah Rice

Seriously, I'm dying to know what Polly wants because I'd love to entice her to frequent my yard. I kid you not when I tell you the realtor used the Monticello Park parrots, among other attractions, to lure my husband into the neighborhood. After all, how many San Antonio neighborhoods can boast feral parrots flying and frolicking amidst their foliage?

Yes, you and I are lucky enough to live in a neighborhood that beautiful, green-bodied Nanday and Mitred Conures squawkingly call home. I couldn't find many details on how long they've been in the area, but they've been around long enough to have their own group page on facebook called "Wild Parrots of San Antonio." Check it out to join in the parrot conversation. It's complete with pictures and video footage of the parrots enjoying an undomesticated lifestyle.

Facebook viewing is convenient, but there's nothing like seeing these feathered residents up close and personal. While the conures evaded my novice birding eyes for a long time, I did become adept at identifying their squawk early on. This was fairly easy as it's among the loudest of any bird in this neck of the woods -- on par with our local bluejays. You will probably hear their scream first and then follow the direction of the sound to locate them. Their mostly green bodies so perfectly blend with tree leaves that it's difficult to spot them otherwise - especially since they tend to like to perch in the upper limbs of very tall trees. I've noticed they travel in pairs and that the neighborhood pecan trees seem to be a favorite daytime hang out, particularly around the 200 block of Club Drive. However, I've been told they rest in palm tree holes and cavities at night. Look for the circular holes near the tops of these trees.

The Nanday Conure Parrot is of the genus Nandayus and is occasionally called the Black-hooded Parakeet due to its cap of black feathers on the top of the head. The mature Nanday is about eleven to twelve inches in length and weighs a little over five ounces. It has a blue chest and bluish green flight feathers with a little ringlet of bright red feathers circling each thigh. (nandayconures.com)

The Mitred Conure is of the genus Aratinga and is also known as the Red-headed Conure, or Mitred Parakeet. The Mitred is a little longer than the Nanday Conure, with a total length of 13 to 15 inches. Mature Mitreds are mostly green with varying amounts of red on the face and thighs. They may also have red feathers scattered on their hindneck, mantle, throat and thighs. (avianweb.com)

Since then, I'm constantly peering out the windows as I move through our home with the hope I'll glimpse one of my feathered friends. I can't help it — I'm enamored with these pretty Pollys. Just this Sunday, there were three Nandays and two Mitreds squawking up a storm in the pecan trees outside our bedroom. Maybe it's time I officially became one of their facebook fans...



When asked about the strengths of the restaurant Valenzuela said, "We live, breathe, and shop in the neighborhood. We know many people in the neighborhood. We offer a unique dining experience. It's not just the food; it is music, the look and feel of the place. He added, "It is a place where diverse cultures come together."

About that time a large group of people arrived from the Westside Chamber of Commerce. "Last week we had a group from University of Texas at El Paso. Tonight we have a group from St. Mary's Young Alumni Association, There are always people from USAA here." It is true that the crowd is multi-dimensional A three-year-old toddles around the bar and cash register. Some seniors sit quietly in the front room reading books or working on a laptop. In the evening there is a mixture of neighborhood folk, a few hippies and even a business person or two.

Finally, the question arises of favorite items on the menu. Valenzuela says without hesitation, "My favorite pizza is the white cheese pizza with Canadian bacon, onion, tomato, and basil. We use garlic infused olive oil and two kinds of cheeses. Other people really like the Deaux Roll." Valenzuela concludes, "Everything is good. We are pizza snobs and are very picky about our pizza."

The drink menu includes beer, wine, soft drinks, tea and water. No hard liquor is served. Judging from the cars lining the streets all around this old gas station turned pizzeria, the neighborhood has a new "Friendly Spot."

WATER, WATER, We need water!

While SAWS has ample water from diverse sources, state law requires reduced pumping when the Edwards Aquifer reaches certain levels. Our neighbors around the region follow the same law, so our actions are a cooperative effort. For more information, please see the chart below or visit the SAWS website: Stage 2 Drought Restrictions



Stage Two Alert begins when the Aquifer level reaches 650 feet mean sea level at the monitored well.

All restrictions from Stage One remain in effect, unless added to or replaced by Stage Two rules.

Landscape watering with an irrigation system, sprinkler or soaker hose is allowed only once a week from 3-8 a.m. and 8-10 p.m. on your designated watering day, as determined by your address.

Watering with drip irrigation or 5-gallon bucket is permitted any day, but only between 3-8 a.m. and 8-10 p.m.

Watering with a hand-held hose is allowed any time on any day.


Use of fountains, waterfalls, or other aesthetic water features outdoors or indoors - is prohibited, unless a variance has been
granted for 100 percent non-potable water use.

All non-public swimming pools must have a minimum of 25 percent of the surface area covered with evaporation screens when not in use. Inflatable pool toys or floating decorations may be used for this purpose.

Washing impervious cover such as parking lots, driveways, streets or sidewalks is prohibited. Health and safety exceptions to this rule may be requested from SAWS in writing.

No watering on weekends with a sprinkler, soaker hose or irrigation system. Areas without a street address, such as medians and neighborhood entryways, water on Wednesday.



The use of commercial car wash facilities is allowed any day.

Operators of golf courses, athletic fields and parks must submit a conservation plan to SAWS. For requirements, contact SAWS at 704-SAVE. Golf courses, athletic fields and parks may not irrigate between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Hotels, motels and other lodging must offer and clearly notify guests of a "linen/towel change on request only" program.

And don't forget to follow these year-round rules:

Water waste is prohibited at all times. This includes lawn watering overspray and runoff.

Restaurants may serve water only on request (to reduce dishwashing).

Charity car washes allowed only at commercial car wash facilities.

Community Gardens: A Growing Trend Worth Trying by Sarah Rice



Simply put, a community garden is a geographic space that is collectively planted and managed by a group of people. The design, content, and method of management are determined by the community group. And, okay, so maybe community gardens aren't exactly a trend. It turns out this concept has been around for a *long* time. However, it wasn't until relatively recently that a number of community gardens began popping up around San Antonio. In 2008 Green Spaces Alliance of South Texas started with 10 gardens in its Community Garden Network, and it now has 32 community gardens throughout San Antonio. In fact, there's one practically in your backyard.

The Jefferson Community Garden is located at 2350 W. Gramercy Place behind Jefferson United

Methodist Church. And, I want you, my Monticello Park neighbor, to get involved! Why? Golly, there are plentiful reasons. Community gardens are places where you can gather with neighbors, exercise, educate children, cultivate fresh produce, grow beautiful flowers, and enjoy and preserve San Antonio's green space. Our neighborhood garden sprouted in 2009 (with Dr. Michael Soto serving as the initial garden coordinator) and is now managed by garden coordinator Sherilyn Strickland with the assistance of Jim Clink.

At the Jefferson Community Garden there are eight raised beds for two gardening methods: 1) communal plots where all the members share in all the work and all the benefits; and 2) individual plots maintained by and for the benefit of a member. Each person desiring an individual plot is asked to contribute a nominal fee to help defray costs of maintaining the garden.

The next community work day is Saturday, September 10, from 7:30 – 10am. We'll be completing summer garden clean up and planting for fall. We need your help and appreciate you coming for part or all of the morning. This is an ideal time to get your hands dirty in the gardens, meet your neighbors and figure out whether you are interested in participating in the communal plots or in securing your own plot.

The purpose of the program is to promote and encourage the retention, preservation, and restoration of locally designated landmarks, historic districts, and architecturally significant structures that have been identified as eligible for historic designation by assisting low to moderate income property owners with their restoration and rehabilitation projects through a combination of grants and loans. This program is not designed to assist in the everyday maintenance of historic properties, but to encourage and aid restoration and preservation efforts which might otherwise be considered economically infeasible. Funds must be used for the preservation, restoration, and rehabilitation of historic properties and structures as described in the following definition: "Historic Property" means any local building, structure, or site, individually landmarked or site located

PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS


- 1. Property owner must have a valid picture identification (Texas Drivers License or Department of Public Safety Picture identification card).
- 2. Structure must be owner-occupied (no rental units).
- 3. Building must exhibit historic and/or architectural significance and must be designated or listed in the:
- i. National Register of Historic Places
- ii. State of Texas Historic Landmark Survey
- iii. City of San Antonio Landmark
- iv. City of San Antonio Historic District (property must be a contributing structure within the district)
- 4. All taxes must be current and paid.
- 5. Property owner must have Homestead Exemption and, (if applicable) Over 65, and Disabled Exemptions.
- 6. Property owner must have a Warranty Deed with clear title to the property.
- 7. If home is mortgaged, balance must not exceed \$8,000.
- 8. Property owner must have acceptable credit (no bankruptcy, judgements) or if no credit history has been established, a 12 month current payment history for utilities will be the standard with no more than one late payment in a year's time.
- 9. Property owner must have current property insurance or be able to provide it within 30 days prior to assistance.
- 10. Property owner must be a U.S. Citizen and/or Legal Resident Alien.
- 11. Property must be zoned residential and located within the city limits of San Antonio.

Effects of Severe Heat: Ideas to Keep Plants Alive

Greetings!


Summer temperatures are at record highs right now and irrigation water for the care of our/your landscapes is being restricted in many areas. High temperatures plus restricted water plus less than optimum irrigation systems will be causing problems in the home and commercial landscapes.

Here are a few things to remember:

- 1. Irrigation systems do not and will never be able to replace the effectiveness of a rain event.
- 2. Hand watering does not and will never be able to replace the effictiveness of irrigation.
- 3. The harsh winter of 2011 caused damage to plant material which may not have shown up yet. With heat and drought, there will begin to be die off of plantings (even trees).
- 4. Some communities have serious restrictions on irrigation system watering. One day or two days per week is all that is allowed.
- 5. Most irrigation systems were not designed to be extremely efficient with only 1 or 2 days per week watering.
- 6. Many irrigation systems were not designed for optimum coverage (see large brown areas in amongst the green areas in turf?)
- 7. Thin soil beneath turf will dry out much faster than deep soil. You will see areas of brown.
- 8. Chinch bugs flourish in turf in the heat and will kill grass 100%.
- 9. Mow turf at the highest possible setting on lawn mowers (to prevent as much drying of soil as possible).
- 10. Choose to skip weeks of mowing to allow turf to grow tall.
- 11. Mulch helps to retain moisture in planting beds.
- 12. Choose to eliminate flowers in landscapes during the summer (require much water).
- 13. Because night time temperatures stay high (HOT) and daytime temperatures soar, plants can never rest and recuperate. They will stay stressed until temps drop and/or it rains significantly.
- 14. Work to keep plants alive. They may not flourish, but strive to keep them alive.



SpaySA's MASH is a mobile surgical unit. Much like our stationary clinic, we perform spay/neuter surgery at low/no cost for the community. At the time of this printing we have spayed/neutered over 3200 dogs and cats!



MASH only requires two things—an enclosed area (gym or other room), and air conditioning. That's it! We bring all of the equipment, floor covering, and kenneling. More importantly, we take it all with us — so there is no clean-up! We even take our trash!

A typical MASH day starts at 6am.
Our technicians arrive and unpack the truck.
We place down tarps and set up our surgical suite.
Clients begin checking in at 7am until 8am.
Surgery runs from 9am to about 2pm.
Animals are picked up from 3-4pm.

Once all the animals are picked up, the technicians clean and pack up all the equipment. That's it!
