

President's Message

Happy New Year!

2014.....Can you believe it??

Monticello Park Neighborhood is a great place to live because of its residents and their service. Many thanks to our volunteers: board members, block captains who distribute the newsletter, flower and halo makers for the 4th of July Children's Parade, Newspaper Editors, Social Committee, Garage Sale Volunteers, National Night Out Volunteers and the Scholarship Committee. Their hard work impacts everyone and our community's quality of life!

MPNA is off to a great start in the New Year. The 2014 MPNA board has 8 returning members from the 2013 board and 2 new members. I am thankful for their time and commitment to serve.

In 2014 there are several neighborhood events that are reoccurring, some new, and the return of events from previous years. We need your help to make these events a success! Do you remember the Dial-a-Trailer? The Tree Challenge? Alley Cleanups? These are 3 events from a few years ago and were huge successes. The Dial-Trailer is a Saturday during which MPNA coordinates with the Solid Waste Department to bring a trash truck into our community for a neighborhood collection. This would allow MPNA residents to have an additional brush and bulky collection right down the block. The Tree Challenge is planting 25 trees in the front or right-of-way areas within MPNA but we need your permission and labor assistance. Alley Clean-ups would be a Saturday in which MPNA targets an overgrown alley and provides resources to assist homeowners in maintaining the alley.

Also, the Beautification Award has been increased to \$5,000 for 2014. These monies are to assist homeowners with exterior home improvements and are made possible with MPNA fundraising and matching funds from the Jefferson Woodlawn Lake Community Development Corporation.

In December I attended a Crime meeting with SAPD and the District 7 Council office. The meeting was to address a specific incident and create a dialog of community concerns. There have been a lot of comments on the MPNA Facebook page about crime: some true and others speculative. During the meeting SAPD stated the crime within the Monticello and Jefferson Neighborhood Associations (boundaries Fredericksburg, St. Cloud, W. Woodlawn, and West Dr-by creek way by Oak Dairy Farms) is lower than the crime rate within the Stone Oak area. It is important if you hear something or see something to please report it to SAPD, 911 for emergencies and 207-SAPD for non-emergencies. By the time this newsletter is printed I hope you had the chance to attend the District 7 Crime Awareness and Prevention Summit.







What's the Word, Bird?



<u>Waxwing Poetic</u>: In search of berry, flocks find merry, so set your sights near, <u>Cedar Waxwings</u> are here! These members of the silky-flycatcher family descend in flocks during our winters to devour pyrancantha, yaupon, holly, and other berries. Catch them while you can – they'll fly in unannounced and be gone in a day or two after cleaning out your berries. Very distinctive in appearance, they have short crests, a narrow dark mask, yellow tipped tails, some red tipped wing feathers, and tan-greyish bodies.

Rover, Red Rover, Let Rufous Come Over: Most of our hummingbird visitors passed through in the fall on their way south of the border, but a few species make surprise winter appearances. The past two weeks we've had a couple of Rufous Hummingbirds at our feeder. These hummers tend to frequent the western U.S. (as far as southeast Alaska in the summer) but a few stray east toward the Gulf Coast in the winter. These hummers are set apart by their coppery feathering, more prominent on the males than females. Buff-bellied Hummingbirds may similarly play surprise visits. A good feeder mix is 4 parts water to 1 part sugar – save the food dye for cascarones!

Ready Your Martin Houses: The **Purple Martins** seem to be arriving earlier each year – our first arrived last year on Feb. 17, on Feb. 19 in 2012, and on Feb. 27 in 2013. Scouts tend to arrive in the first wave, followed by larger groupings within the next month. If you don't have a Purple Martin house, now is the time to get one in place – look for an area in your yard with plenty of open space for landings and departures and don't be surprised if it takes a couple of years to have a group establish a home base – once established, you can count on repeat returns. And if you have a martin house, time to clean house and evict the sparrows!






