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"This includes rocking, feeding, and taking children on walks. We play with them." She also volunteers occasionally at Haven for Hope, doing whatever is needed there. "It makes me happy to work in the Shelter."

Edith Cuellar described a different kind of gift that she received. "It's Victor—our gift from Heaven." Victor is their fifty-six year old son with Down Syndrome. He is almost deaf and does not speak; yet, he is very personable. He greeted this reporter with a warm handshake and a hug. Amador, the father, explained that he had a job for fifteen years packaging pharmaceuticals. He earned Social Security credit during those years. Edith said that the job ended when the company closed down.

Amador Cuellar told of growing up in Hondo, Texas as one of ten children. He and his family lived on a farm five miles from town and the school. "We walked to school each day. My dad bought my older brother a bicycle to ride to school. I still had to walk. Later, my mother decided that I needed a bicycle too. She bought me a bicycle at Western Auto in Hondo so that I could ride too." He described his Christmases as very simple. "We didn't have a Christmas tree or any presents. We had each other and that seemed enough. At Christmas, Mother made special meals. We always had plenty of

food since we grew up on a farm. In fact, when we went to school, the nuns would ask us to share our food with other children. And we did because the nuns told us to. Mother packed our lunch in a bucket. She put

told us to. Mother packed our lunch in a bucket. She put in extra food for the other children."

Lynne Wilkerson had some interesting thoughts on giving. "We all know that giving is the right thing to do. When we give, it makes us feel good." Wilkerson did some research and further stated, "It turns out that when we give, it changes our brain chemistry, releasing endorphins." Endorphins are also released when we exercise, and hence, we feel on top of the world after exercise and also when giving. Finally, it increases your longevity. "So if you want to be happy—Give."

My special gift this year is a dog, named Grover. I lost my ornery and fussy dog, Lucky, about two years ago. He was old, senile, and could barely walk. So getting a replacement was quite difficult. My niece, Amy Hardberger, decided to take matters into her own hands. If you have ever met Amy, she is like a West Texas storm blowing through. Just stand back as things are about to happen. She found one dog in the SNIPSA website. That dog had already been given away. Then, I saw this cute black and white little bit of everything dog. I was smitten. She arranged for a meeting with the dog at the SNIPSA office and the next thing I knew, I was filling out papers and Amy was paying the adoption fees. Bingo! I had a new dog right before Christmas. Thank goodness, he was on his timid, new dog behavior, for my Christmas Party. I must say that things have changed and he is a real handful. But I have a dog that adores me and I in turn adore back and give each day to his well-being.

So giving and getting gifts comes in many forms. Whatever form it takes—whether wrapped a box with shiny paper or a friend helping another get to the doctor, it enriches our life. Let's give and receive with joy!


We also had amazing volunteers who made multiple aspects of the tour come together. The committee is very grateful to:







Grow Over It! by Lisa McKenzie (Code Connection newsletter)

We're always looking for innovative programs to deter graffiti. Our newest one is a concept from Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED), encouraging planting greenery in front of tagged walls, or in areas with high incidences of graffiti vandalism. *Grow Over Graffiti*, in partnership with the Parks & Recreation Department, offers free trees through an application process.

Has your commercial or residential property (within city limits) been vandalized lately? Are your ready for a 3-year tree maintenance agreement? If you answered "yes." then you're ready to deter graffiti. Applications are accepted year-round with an attach signed 3-year tree maintenance agreement.

Don't forget, call 811 for free utility line locator service before choosing the final planting site. Once it's been cleared to dig, there are seven drought-tolerant tree species you can select from. If a tree isn't suitable for your location because underground utility lines prohibit digging, consider planting ivy or other plants along fence lines or walls. Reducing the surface will help in keeping the wall graffiti-free.

City of San Antonio 2017-2022 Bond

On Thursday January 19th City Council passed an Ordinance approving 173 projects totaling \$830 million for a Special Bond Election on May 6, 2017. Projects are divided into categories and each category will be an item on the ballot. Projects within Monticello Park and the greater community are:

Streets/Sidewalks and Bridges:

- 1) District 7 Sidewalk Improvements (Benrus, Wilson, Fredericksburg, Loma Linda & Lake Blvd) \$2,800,000
- 2) Monticello Park Area Streets \$3,936,000
- 3) Thomas Jefferson High School Area Improvements \$3,600,000

Drainage & Flood Control:

1) Seeling Channel Phase 3 Drainage \$18,000,000

Parks and Recreation:

- 1) Monticello Park \$300,000
- 2) Old Spanish Walking Trails Park \$3,075,000
- 3) Woodlawn Lake Park Multi-Generational Center \$5,000,000


