



Looking Back at the Woodlawn Lumber Company

Did you ever wonder where the materials for building your home came from? Most of us will never know for certain, this may give you a clue. A local home center, the Woodlawn Lumber Company, was the source for lumber, building materials, and hardware for many of the homes built in our area. This building stood at 925 Fredericksburg Road, and once the home center went out of business, housed a local hobby store as recently as 15 years ago. The article below introduced the new home store to the community in 1925. This building was eventually remodeled from the English style to a Mid-Century style as seen in a photo from 2007. The lumber sheds are also visible in this view. By 2013, the building had been demolished, and a few years later Stripes built a convenience store on the site.

Something new in the line of lumber offices has been instituted by the Woodlawn Lumber Company in their place of business on the Fredericksburg Road between Craig and Woodlawn avenues.

The company, which was incorporated October 1, with C. E. Odell as president and manager, styles itself "The Home Builders' Department Store," and the office building, erected on the front of the 175 x 25-foot [lot] which also houses their lumber business, bears out the slogan in every point.

The interior of the attractive English-style stucco building combines all the features of a modern upto-date office with that of an equally modern hardware and builders' supplies store, without doing

discredit to either.

On one side of the 40 x 40-foot room, a handsome oak counter, running the entire length of the room, enclosed the office, while the other side from floor to ceiling is equipped with the latest type wall cabinets for the display and storage if all sorts of builders' tools and small hardware. The cabinets are of the interchangeable unit system type, with glass display panels in the front and storage space within the drawers of varying sizes. Further modern display space is arranged for paints, garden tools, building supplies, and various items of home equipment, which the company will feature in its efforts to truly serve the immediate section of the city in which it is located.

The interior finish of the office building is especially fine, oak being light-colored enamel and delicate tinting of woodwork and walls, and this, with the indirect system of lighting used, is most effective in


enhancing the beauty of the interior.

Three show windows, two in front and one on the side of the building, are hung with valances bearing the name and monogram of the company and give place for the display of goods handled by the firm.

At the rear of the lot has been erected the first unit of the company's lumber sheds, double-deck and opening from either side. A second unit will be built in the near future. Fine graveled drives have been put in about the buildings, and an up-to-date motor equipment is used for delivery.

The Woodlawn Lumber Company finances the building of homes and in connection with this has a

plan service for the convenience of its patrons.

Tree Pruning 101

A Guide to Enhancing Your Yard by Cathy Teague



Monticello Park is a neighborhood blessed with many beautiful, heritage trees. With cooler weather on the horizon, it's time to think about fall yard maintenance. One task that yields quick results is tree trimming. There are great DIY sites such as www.treeremoval.com to help you get started. Late fall/early winter is the best time to perform this task because without tree leaves, you can get a better idea of which branches need to be removed. The tree also has a retter chance of retaining its nutrients when you prune it during the dormant season.

As with any DIY project, you need the right tools such as safety glasses, pruning shears, lopping shears, a pole pruner and a rope saw. Keep your tools sharpened to ensure clean cuts so the tree will heal more quickly. If you're a beginner tree trimmer, it is a good idea to leave anything that also involves a ladder and/or a chain saw to the professionals.

Pruning stimulates growth. It enables you to ensure branches are heading in the right direction and not rubbing on or competing with one another. Pruning gives you the opportunity remove weak and misdirected branches. Begin by walking around the tree and surveying which branches (you shape from the inside out) need to be removed to enhance the shape of the tree and allow more light to penetrate. Carefully thinning a tree will reduce the strain on larger branches and encourage it to keep its natural shape. Also consider whether any branches are leaning on the home or its roof, getting in the way of cars and pedestrians or blocking stop signs and important sight lines drivers need for safety.

NEVER remove more than one-third growth from a tree. Start at the bottom by removing offshoots and suckers that take energy away from the body of the tree and distract from its shape and appearance. Try to tackle larger branches by cutting them in pieces from the outside in toward the trunk to avoid tearing. Remove stubs by cutting them at an angle to shed water. Not all stubs need to be sealed but, you certainly should seal any oaks and elms to avoid the spread of diseases such as oak wilt. Specifically, oak trees should not be pruned from early larch through July because the sap feeding beetles that spread oak wilt are active during this time. 
There are workshops at the Historic Homeowner Fair to learn hands-on skills, such as restoring old windows and, other educational sessions. Monticello Park Improvement

Where Are We in the Process by Cathy Teague

Our neighborhood's favorite gathering place, Monticello Park, has been the focus of much behind-the-scenes activity between the MPNA Board and the city this year. In the Spring, the Board met with TCI Bond Project staff to review initial plans for park improvements. You may recall that monies were set aside in the voter-approved 2017 Bond Issue for park improvements. This meeting was crucial in forcing the city to listen and learn how critical it was for the original dream of Monticello Park to be realized. In short, our park—from the design of the gazebo to its signage and walking path—was not executed according to its original plans and now is the opportunity to take a big stride toward making it happen.



At the last general assembly meeting, the Board and those residents who attended, raised oncerns regarding the projected costs, the management fees and the proposed scope of work. The TCI staff also received feedback regarding preferred materials to be used given the impact of frequent street flooding on a portion of the park. So, the city went back to the drawing board to refine the proposal.

In a recent MPNA Board meeting, decisions were made regarding the walking trail, the gazebo, signage and lighting. Instead of crushed granite, for example, the preferred choice for the trail is decorative, stamped concrete. Embellishments to the gazebo such as ironwork grills around the dome, bench seating and other changes were also discussed as well as improved signage and proposed lighting.

The Board drilled hard on the original proposed costs presented to the community in July and are pleased to report that in a subsequent meeting, the TCI staff adjusted the budget to reflect approximately 79% dedicated for construction and 21% for managements fees, including design management. The facility budget is \$197,000.00 for labor and materials. This ratio for construction costs to management/design fees is approximately the same as other similar park projects.

After much discussion, the Board prioritized for the city which improvements should be undertaken now and which could be delayed based on the overall cost. Improvement of the walking trail and the gazebo are our top priorities. Currently, the city is receiving bids based on these decisions. If there are additional monies left over, we want to improve the signage and add thing on the Club Street side of the park. The Board anticipates another meeting with the TCI Bond staff later this fall.
